ABOUT

ounded in 1983, Woodinville Montessori School is a nonprofit, independent Montessori school. It is a diverse community of lifelong learners dedicated to the optimal intellectual, emotional, social, physical, ethical and spiritual development of each child using Montessori and contemporary methods.

Since its beginning as a preschool, WMS has gradually added grade levels over the years. It has expanded to two campuses. The main campus in Bothell serves toddlers through high school students, while the original campus in Woodinville exclusively serves early childhood pupils.

The academically challenging program is designed to foster independence, love for learning and global awareness. Our ideology and philosophy are based on the work of Dr. Maria Montessori. Our program embraces and consciously implements her ideas on individual learning, community development, environmental awareness and world peace.

WMS Program levels: toddler, early childhood, lower elementary (grades 1-3) upper elementary (grades 4-6), middle school (grades 7-8) and high school (grades 9-12).

ADMISSION

he admissions process seeks a good fit between a family's goals and values and the school's program and philosophy. Prospective students should also demonstrate the independence, responsibility and motivation necessary to succeed in the relative freedom of a Montessori classroom.

CURRICULUM

oodinville Montessori High School's curriculum either meets **V** or exceeds Washington state graduation requirements, with flexibility for students to pursue individual projects of interest, stretch themselves with Honors classes and receive support in challenge areas. The intent is to build a foundation in the humanities, mathematics and sciences that enables students to discern and prepare for the college or career experience of their choice, while helping them develop a high level of independence, self discipline, social problem-solving and responsibility for their own learning. The program is oriented toward fostering a global perspective, diving deeply into knowledge and applying learning to real world situations. The academic year comprises two semesters further divided into cycles or quarters. Thematic and integrated units of study are presented in all humanities and sciences.

Minimum requirements for graduation:

English—4 years

Social Studies— 4 years

Mathematics—3 years, 4 recommended

Science—3 years, 4 recommended

World Languages—2 years, 3 recommended

Fine Arts—2 years

Career & Tech Ed—1 year

Electives—4 years

Health & Fitness—2 years

Senior Project—non-credit graduation requirement

Service Learning—60 hours/4 years

All core subjects are offered at both standard and honors levels.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

External Learning—Students participate in several external learning trips throughout high school. Each year students attend a nature-based program to begin the school year. Each spring students travel to either Chicago, to study architecture, Atlanta, to study the civil rights movement, Washington DC, to study government or Ashland, Ore., to experience the Shakespeare Festival.*

Service Learning—Our students complete over 15 hours of community service per year. Each student must complete half of their community service hours outside of the WMS community.*

Senior Project—WMS Seniors have the opportunity to explore a passion as they launch their Senior Project. Projects range from research projects focusing on local planning initiatives to the building of a tiny house to be donated to a local tiny house village. Ideally the project will be community focused and solution oriented. Each project culminates with the submission of a paper and a student presentation to the community. *See full description in the high school course catalog*.

Orienteering—This sport is an ongoing tradition at Woodinville Montessori and is part of our curriculum. All 9th and 10th graders take Orienteering. Our teams have won national competitions for many years. The WMS Orienteering Team is a club sport for grades 1-12.*

ELECTIVES AND CLUBS

Students may choose from a selection of after-school electives—even independent electives—and clubs for enrichment and balance. Clubs include Orienteering, pickleball, soccer, Junior State of America (JSA), Montessori Model UN (MMUN), American Rocketry Challenge, Dungeons and Dragons (D&D), and the Raven Review newsletter.*

COVID-19 RESPONSE

SPRING SEMESTER 2020

- Woodinville Montessori High School closed on March 11, 2020 and remained closed in response to Washington state's mandated school closure through the remainder of the academic year.
- Students transitioned to remote learning via Zoom on March 12, 2020.
- No school days were missed as a result of the closure.
- Our remote learning schedule was designed to mirror our in-person schedule and ensured that students met with their teachers daily for classes 9 a.m. 3 p.m., with drop-in work time available on Fridays in lieu of classes.
- Clubs remained active virtually.
- Grading policy Students receiving a Q4 grade of A, B or C had their semester grades frozen at their Q3 level unless they improved over the course of Q4. Students receiving a Q4 grade of D or E were given the opportunity to achieve mastery by completing work over the summer break. The submission of summer work upgraded a student's Q4 grade to a B-, which was then averaged with their Q3 grade to determine their final semester grade.
- Athletics programs were canceled.

2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR

Fall semester

- Remote learning remained in place for the fall semester of the 2020-2021 academic year.
- Students followed our synchronous learning program, meeting with teachers daily 8:30 a.m. 3:30 p.m.
- Social-emotional learning (SEL) became a priority, with SEL programming taking place within traditional classes and also via SEL-specific classes each week.
- Fall PSAT administration canceled.
- Clubs remained active virtually.
- Athletics programs were canceled.
- Programming requiring in-person participation was paused.

Spring semester

- Students had the option to return to in-person learning for spring semester.
- Grading policy grading for the academic year returned to the WMS traditional policy. Expectations for grading and work mirrored non-COVID school years.

FALL SEMESTER 2021 TO PRESENT

- All students returned to full in-person learning.
- All clubs and activities resumed in-person.
